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

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

We took a short walk to a vista above the Crystal Basin Recreation Area. This area is composed of a trio of lakes that receive drainage from the Crystal Range in the Sierra. They are Loon Lake, Ice House, Union Valley reservoirs. As a result of a joint partnership between SMUD and the US Forest Service in 1957, it provides hydroelectric power to an estimated 180,000 homes in the Sacramento area and a water storage system.

After snapping a group photo, we headed back down the hill, continuing our journey towards our final destination Camp Virner Restaurant in Georgetown, California. The views along the drive were spectacular and our pace was optimal since we encountered zero traffic along Ice House and Wentworth Springs roads. We

hung together as a group really well as we snaked through the forest. Lisa managed to change into her little "dirndl" Oktoberfest dress in the front seat of our 911 while we motored through the forest.

Arriving at Camp Virner Restaurant we snapped yet another group photo since we arrived just ahead of schedule. 
Remember...Mendocino Same Time. Next Year!




I am ready to take on the duties of the Membership Director.

Preparing your Porsche for the Winter

There are several ways to approach preparing your Porsche for winter. Among them are, what your buddy has told you to do, what you think you should do, what the auto parts salesperson recommended while he sold you products. Then, there are the suggestions I will make to you now.

Of the many ways to approach this we are going to cover the basics. First, ask yourself if you are going to store it all winter long (unlikely in California) or is it just until the first clear crisp day that comes along and you're looking for some quality driving time, a short trip to visit a friend, or just get out of the house to grab a cup of coffee. We all can agree these cars love those crisp mornings. And most of us can agree that the worst winter here in Northern California is still the best day in the Midwest during the winter.

Anyhow let's move along. Here are some basics. Detail the car before putting it to bed. Good coat of wax, treat the interior, vacuum all the nooks and crannies, clean the wheels. And something many of us don't think about but should be done; treat the door rubber seals, hood and trunk seals with a rubber treatment (this is similar advice to those who lived back east and have their vehicles winterized just to use every day). We use a product called RuGLYDE from Napa #765-1338.

Next step is the fuel system. I recommend a fuel Stabilizer (Amsoil has a good product). This should be added to the fuel tank prior to storing your Porsche.

Remember to drive your Porsche after adding the fuel stabilizer to insure the stabilizer is fully mixed with your fuel. There are many opinions that the tank should be empty or full. I suggest full - less chance of condensation occurring causing issues when you start it up in the spring.

The engine oil should be addressed in either of two ways. If it's due for an oil change, do It! If it's been recently changed and looks clean, then leave it. The opinions of draining it and leaving it dry are ok, but I have seen a few motors leak more after leaving the engine sit dry for several months. Then I have seen several just continue to leak or seep. Do whatever works for you.

Now the part that actually requires one to make a decision. Do I put the car up on stands or let it sit on the tires? In the perfect world, you may have an old set of wheels and tires and swap them out. Then during the holidays when you need a break from the table, you can go out to the garage and detail a wheel.

If the car is not going to be moved for several months, I suggest having the spare set of wheels and tires. If you think you will take it out Thanksgiving or Christmas morning, then let it sit on the tires. You can raise the car up on jack stands at a later date. If you have a 356, you would want to support it at the axle housing, not on the tube, in order to keep the axle boots from leaking. Also if the car is sitting all winter on the tires, put a few

extra pounds of air in them.

The next item would be addressing the battery. If this is a long storage situation, I recommend disconnecting the battery. For short term storage, you can leave it connected and spray some battery protective coating on the post and terminal. In both situations, purchase a battery tender such as CTEK. They are available in 6 and 12 volt versions, and a nice option to these units is that you can leave it attached to your battery, and just use the weatherhead connector to attach it to the charger unit. They also offer a lighter adapter.

One may think I forgot about those of you who own a watercooled Porsche. Well, most everything here relates to you also. You should check your coolant level and make a note of its level. In the Spring, if it's dropped you may have a leak. The coolant should be tested by your repair shop with either a test strip or refractometer. If you are in an area where freezing occurs the coolant must be able to withstand those freezing temps. One last thing regarding water-cooled engines. Whether your car is stored over the winter or it's a special occasion car, the IMS bearing dries out when sitting for long periods of time. You need to start the car once a week, and let the oil circulate for 4 – 6 minutes to get the water temp up off the temp gauge peg to insure the IMS bearing is lubricated. The M96 motors started with the 1998 Boxster models, and 1999 in the Carrera/Cayman models to 2005. Remember, open the garage door and back your Porsche onto the driveway to avoid the exhaust gases.

Also the winter is a good time to tinker on those little things you never get to when the weather is nice. Lubricate the hinges, door locks, ignition, and so on.

Finally invest in a good breathable car cover. Next step is getting the car ready for the first spring voyage.

Cambria Tour

The Plan

I wanted to share with our friends a section of aviation not often experienced. To accomplish this I called on my long time friend of 30+ years, Chuck Wentworth, owner of Antique Aero located in Paso Robles.

The Man.

Chuck formed Antique Aero in 1991 and has been responsible for the restoration and/or construction of over 24 WWI and several pre war aircraft. Chuck is also an accomplished pilot and has flown the 1909 Bleriot, the WWII Corsair and everything in between!

Whether the restoration of an original, or the construction of a replica, the aircraft are exactly as they were in every detail including the engines, instruments, construction methods covering etc. They are truly works of art and Chuck's talent and passion shines thru on every aircraft.

The Displayed Aircraft

The Sopwith Triplane was first built in 1917 and started a triplane craze. It pre dates the Fokker D.rl Triplane made famous by the Red Barron. Although enjoying initial success the Sopwith eventually fell out of favor with the Pilots. The aircraft had a poor roll rate and low top speed due to the plethora of external wires and struts that brace the three wings.

The Fokker D.VI is a biplane powered by a German copy of the French Le Rhone 110 HP Rotary engine. In this design the engine rotates around

the crankshaft which is bolted directly to the airframe. This same engine powers the fore mentioned Sopwith! The D.VI has very good performance and flight characteristics making it one of Chuck's favorite WWI aircraft. However the D.VI saw limited service as it was quickly replaced by the larger and faster Mercedes powered D.VII

The crown jewel of the WWI aircraft is an original 1917 Sopwith Camel (also Rotary powered). The British built an astonishing 5,500 Camels in only 1.5 years! Only 6 original Camels are known to exist and of those only one built by Sopwith and that Camel was there for our viewing! In 1995 this Sopwith built Camel flew in England for Tom Sopwith's 100th birthday and has not flown since.

The Ford Trimotor S/N 87 was built in 1927 and was used by Mexicana as an airliner during the 1930s. Chuck graciously invited everyone to explore the inside of the Ford and get a sense of airline travel during the early days of commercial aviation. Large by the standards of the day and slow by today's standards, Chuck quickly pointed out that while only cruising at 5,000 feet and 100 MPH it was still way faster and more comfortable that driving 25 MPH down a dirt road in a Model A!

The Navy Aircraft Company N3N and Boeing PT-17 Stearman biplanes were both primary trainers in WWII.

The Grumman TBM Avenger torpedo bomber was built in March 1945. This aircraft is painted in the markings of the aircraft that George W Bush flew in WWII. In fact Chuck told us that former President Bush sat in this very aircraft.

The last aircraft on display was a F4U Corsair. Known by its pilots as the "bent wing bird", it was also affectionately known as "whistling death" by the Japanese! This Corsair was built by the Goodyear aircraft company in March of 1945 and is one of only a hand full of Corsairs that survived the mass scrapping of WWII aircraft after the wars end.

We all reached the lunch stop successfully, and the park had ample tables for everyone to have a comfortable picnic lunch. There was plenty of parking too, and many took pictures of Porsches lined up on both sides of the street. And of course, everyone resumed their quest to put the right name with each picture in the "Who's Who" packet. What a hoot!

Before we knew it, we were on our way to the next stop, the Valero gas station! Sounds funny, but that really was our next stop. The roads on this segment were particularly exciting, especially from the backdoor perspective. There were many curves, but also enough longer straights that allowed for a wonderful view of the Porsches ahead of us.

We soon arrived at our next stop, Bella Luna Estate Winery. The property was basically closed to the public, being reserved for the exclusive enjoyment of our group. Every square foot of parking/pavement was occupied by Porsches, creating another fantastic sight! Everyone was able to taste many different Bella Luna wines, and also partake in a great assortment of appetizers.

The proprietors of Bella Luna are WWII aircraft enthusiasts, having known the Sanders for many years. They went overboard to make us feel welcome, and everyone in the group seemed to be totally enjoying themselves. Little by little, people started leaving to head on to Cambria, and the departures looked like a well-choreographed ballet with Porsches moving here and there to navigate around parked cars.

A short drive from the winery put us on westbound CA46 heading towards Cambria. We soon arrived at our destination, the Cambria Pines Lodge. This was another aspect of the tour that was new to us, and we were very pleased with the resort. When we made our reservation, we opted for a suite, as did many of the participants. We loved our HUGE room. And since we were driving the Macan, we had LOTS of stuff to unpack! The Kinders thought it was quite entertaining watching me take trip after trip between the car and our

With barely enough time to unpack (at least for us!), the welcome reception began in a beautiful lawn

area next to the main building of the lodge. Many stories were told about the drive, and everyone was able to relax and wind down from an eventful day of driving. With the evening being "open" some went to dinner, while others retired to the bar. Ah, the bar. The bar featured live entertainment both Friday and Saturday nights and many from the tour where there each night.

Early Saturday morning, the group re-convened (with cars) at the front of the lodge. Another drivers meeting was held, outlining the tour we would be taking up the coast and inland. The tour would ultimately end up at our lunch destination, Antique Aero in Paso Robles.

Again, we ran close to the back door and in all my years in the club, I have never seen such a line of Porsches, un-interrupted, traveling up Highway 1 for as far as the eye could see. What a sight! And it was amazing how many "civilian" cars were pulled over on the shoulder taking pictures of the group as we drove by. After many miles, we turned to head inland, on Nacimiento Road. What a road! We slowly zigzagged upward until we reached the top, all the while enjoying many spectacular views of the Pacific Ocean.

We soon reached our first stop, the Nacimiento campground. We all parked along the right shoulder of the road, in case any traffic came by; none did.

We then continued on to our next stop, Mission San Antonio. We parked for a group photo, with some venturing into the mission to do some exploring.

Back into the cars, we headed to our lunch destination, Antique Aero in Paso Robles. Another friend of Brian operates an air museum specializing in WW1 aircraft. Perhaps the crown jewel of the collection isn't from WW1, however. The Ford Tri-motor airplane is one most of us had only seen in photos, and there are very few which have survived to today. Many of us were able to actually climb inside and get a real feel for what aviation was like during its era.

A very nice buffet lunch was served before we were all given a presentation about the various planes in the collection. Also, there were perhaps two-dozen different engines lined up on the perimeter of the hanger we were in, and we heard many stories about unique approaches to their designs. I found the design where the crankshaft of the engine was attached to the plane,

while the rest of the engine rotated around it to be the most interesting. What an interesting approach! It was explained that the design cooled the engine better!

Remember the gliders everyone got in the goodie bags? Well, we all brought them with us on the tour to Antique Aero, and assembled them for our next competition, the glider toss. Simple rules were to line up together and toss your glider. The glider that goes the furthest wins! Some folks modified their glider in order to get an advantage, however most modifications had the opposite effect. My modified glider failed miserably.

We soon all departed and headed back to the Cambria Pines Lodge, and started getting ready for dinner. The dinner was held in our own private dining room, complete with a real bar! The wait staff was exceptional, and was able to get everyone was served in a timely manner, and the food was great



Veterans Day, A Time to Remember

rest at the Presidio, San Francisco. I never met him. I do remember the talk of the bedroom in their Carmichael home that was full of his collection of military memorabilia and treasures. We are the caretakers of a commemorative china tea set. We also have a civil war cavalry sword, complete with scabbard, hanging above our family room sofa.

Mike's mother, Betty Lou, was a real military brat. She was born October 15, 1926, while the family was stationed in Honolulu, Hawaii. She spoke of watching the building of the Golden Gate Bridge, while they were stationed at the Presidio. We always thought Betty resembled that other "Betty", Lauren Bacall. Betty caught the eye of a photographer and a portrait of her became a "Buy Bonds" poster with the byline "What We are Fighting For". She met Mike's father, James Clinton **Dunn,** while working in the typing pool at McClellan AFB. He was secretary to the general at McClellan. Betty and Jim courted by borrowing the general's staff car and married August, 9, 1945. By the way Betty and Jim were both avid auto

crossers and owned Triumph TR3's and for a time a Jaguar XKE. Sadly, there is no history of a Porsche. They are all gone now.

On Veteran's Day your family stories should be remembered, honored and retold, so they are not lost to future generations. By sharing family stories, a veteran becomes more than just their vital statistics. It is a way to pay tribute to their service. As our family demonstrates, military service is a family affair.

So sometime ask me what I know about my great uncle, **Richard Bunten**, and his service in the Spanish American War. But that's another story for another Veteran's Day.

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

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
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
