of the year, every year. This requires the removal of the front bumper and loosening up the A/C condensers from their mounts. I typically will collect several handfuls of leaves, twigs and cigarette butts. Following up with stiff spray with water, a few cups worth of dirt and grit usually wash out onto the driveway. All that cumulative gunk does your car no favors. Our 996 is fast approaching 200k on the odometer. No kidding!







No - EASY Goodbye

It's a beautiful Saturday morning. The European Auto Salvage Yard (EASY) was having its final Cars and Coffee get-together in Emeryville, CA. Before the sun rose, Matt and I warmed up our silver 996 and met up with SVR's Social Media Chair John Leet in his beautiful agate gray metallic 991. Our drive to EASY was straightforward. The SF Bay Area weather was perfect when we arrived at 7:50 AM. It was crisp and clear.

This widely known Cars and Coffee Meet always starts at 8 AM, but even if you show up on time, the street is already full. If you want to get a good spot, plan to arrive at least 1 hour early. When we arrived, the street was already packed full of cars. Hundreds of fellow enthusiasts watched us cruise through to get our spot. We parked

around the corner next to the Pixar Studios main gate. By 9 am, cars were starting to double-park on Harlan Street. EASY has been a long-time host of Cars and Coffee meets on the first Saturday of each month, which has now grown out to fill both ends of the street and around the corner. Typically, about 80 cars show up. Several dozen vintage and outlaw Porsches are the

norm. Today, the unofficial count was easily in the hundreds. The socializing was in full swing and the streets were jammed with wall to wall Porsches. It was well worth the dark-30 departure and 1 hour 20-minute drive to be a part of this special morning.

EASY (European Auto Salvage Yard) has been a part of the NorCal Porsche culture for four decades, and the shop's owner **Jim Breazeale** is one of the true pillars of this community. His operation has sold early Porsche parts to countless people and repair shops here in the United States and around the world. On the backside of that, he bought wrecks and kept many thousands of cars from going to the crusher. Fanatical about the 356 and early 911's, he also raced a 914 in 24 Hours of Lemons events. His son **Richard Breazeale** grew

up around this indoor salvage yard and eventually joined the team as he matured. Longtime employee **John Montano** was a pivotal presence over the many years too. Since Pixar Studios moved in, the neighborhood heavily gentrified and the values of property in this area of Emeryville, CA exploded in recent years. This makes the building worth much more than its Porsche



parts within. While many saw this day ultimately coming, most are a bit awestruck. Jim is retiring, and he sold the building.

The famed R Gruppe always dominates the meet and gets almost all of the prime parking up in front. They're a tight nit band of hardcore early aircooled Porsche enthusiasts. This place is such a big deal it has attracted well known TV shows such as Chasing Classic Cars and multiple magazine articles. But wait, we quickly recognized a yellow 1977 911S parked right up in front that

belongs to SVR's concours chair Al Price. After buying our EASY tee-shirts, getting our cups of coffee and a few donuts, we started our stroll of all things air cooled. Eventually we found SVR members Al Price, Erik Schmid and James Buckner to enjoy great conversation. So that made a total of five SVR members present at last count. We even met with some of the folks who organize the wellknown Folsom Cars and Coffee. Let's not forget the dogs! The Dachshund's were out in full force and the German breed dominated the event (ours included of course). We made sure to walk the warehouse and soak in what was left of the place. We came across a few stacks of doors and hoods. No less than 3 carcasses of unknown year 911's and a short row of 914's was still there. Hanging from the rafters were a few dozen early 911 window frames. A vast majority of shelves were already empty. Much of this inventory was sold off and hauled away to Parts Obsolete in McMinnville, Oregon. Another big

chunk was hauled to Emory Motorsports in North Hollywood, CA. What was left was waiting to be identified as scrap or to be consolidated with other sellable parts and assemblies.

As word would have it, the new owners of the building are interested in maintaining the spirit of this great gathering. They will be inviting the Porsche community back to continue the monthly tradition. For we all know, it's not just about the cars,

it's about the people. Before getting back in our 911's, we walked around the corner to an amazing consignment showroom named Fantasy Junction. This place is packed with exceptionally rare exotics and classics.

On our ride back to Sacramento, we had a great lunch with John Leet at



Wren's Cafe' in Vacaville.

We all wish Jim a well-deserved retirement. See you later, but not good bye.

People, Places and Porsches

SVR Organizes First Event Chair Seminar





Club Social Director, Mardi Quain, hosted the club's first event chair seminar on Saturday, January 23rd. The event was attended by nearly 30 members that had volunteered to chair an event or who had an interest in chairing a future event. For many years, the level of information provided by the club to its event chairs has varied. There have been a few hiccups over the years getting events marketed in a timely manner and submitting budgets on time.

Assisted by club president Gregg Plourde and past president Collin Fat the 2 hour seminar reviewed dozens of topics related to conducting a successful event including; venue selection, venue location, menu development, pricing, accommodations, parking, marketing, and of course submission of the budget. Also discussed were the issues of the club's refund policy, restaurant contracts, and deposit requirements. Many of those in attendance had prior experience hosting events, Liz Houser, Mardi Quain, Ruth and Marvin Stark, and Matt and Lisa Menning, and provided insightful suggestions. Long time SVR member, Rik Larson, spoke in depth about getting your event advertised in the Drifter and on the club calendar and stressed that it be done no later than 3 months prior to your event.

Collin Fat addressed issues related to choosing a venue for the event, suggestions for menu selection, room capacity, privacy, and restaurant contract agreements.

Host, Mardi Quain, spent a lot of time reviewing the budget submittal process including how additional fees not included in the menu pricing should be handled. These additional fees include room charges, on line registration fees (Eventbrite), and table decorations.





President, Gregg Plourde, reviewed the process of collecting event fees using online registration or the more traditional option of registering my mail. He also addressed how to market your event, basic information needed in designing your flier, monthly e-blasts, and requirements for submitting post event articles to the Drifter.

Following the presentation, a small group of members organizing tours met for about an hour to review the club's tour guidelines. With the assistance of Matt and Lisa Menning, Rik Larson, Gary Griffith and I, we addressed route considerations, safety, updated PCA standards, insurance requirements, hotel accommodations, and timing of lunch and meal stops. In attendance were Liz Houser (Weaverville Tour), Robert Lee, Ernie and Wendy Bulhoes.

Initial feedback from all in attendance was quite positive and that it made volunteering to chair events and little less mysterious and much more attainable. Thank you to all those members who volunteered to lead or chair an event. Without you, the club's annual activities would surely be less fulfilling.

R U Driving a Tanning Booth

A common experience to all homeowners is the discovery that your beloved sofa, that sits proudly beneath the window, has faded to a shadow of its once "perfect" color. Or your window coverings have "suddenly" shredded at your touch. The sun has done its damage. Our vehicles are subject to the same kind of cumulative UVA/UVB exposure damage. And then there's our skin, which can prematurely age (although at this age, prematurely is pushing it), damage the eyes with cataracts (been there, already had that fixed) and develop skin cancers. According to Amy and David Kurokawa at Rocky Mountain Auto Works, vehicle

immune system. UVB rays will usually burn the superficial layers of your skin. It plays a key role in the development of skin cancer."

Sun protection factor (SPF) means the amount of time you can stay in the sun without sunburn. It is different for everyone. For example, if unprotected you

would begin to burn in 15

minutes, an SPF sunscreen of 15 means you should be able to go 15 min. x 15 = 225 min. before beginning to burn. SPF does not measure UVA ray protection. Ultraviolet protection factor (UPF) is a rating for clothing to measure how much ultraviolet (UV) radiation is blocked. For example, a UPF 25 means 1/25th (4%) of UV radiation passes through the fabric to the skin. "Window film is recommended as part of a Comprehensive Sun Protection Program by the

Skin Cancer Foundation." So when the car top is down, I'm still using my SPF 30 sunscreen, a hat and the UPF 50 exposure jacket. But when the roof is up, my skin has great protection, thanks to window tint.

The factors to consider when choosing vehicle window film are privacy, style, comfort, sun protection

and heat rejection. A film with privacy tint will hide those Christmas presents on the seat and discourage a smash and grab. When tempered glass windows with film protection break, the pieces tend to hold together with the film instead of scattering everywhere. In an accident, that would be much safer protection for the driver, passengers,

children and pets. (That is if children and pets are even allowed in your vehicle.)

There are choices in degree of tint. You can have the "cool" factor of dark tint and enjoy the "limo" privacy. By selecting darker shades of the same tint product, you get more heat rejection and privacy as you go darker. You do not get more UV protection as you go darker in shade. They are all greater than 99%. When privacy is not a requirement but UV protection is, there is a clear, no tint, option. Clearly new information to me. (Pun definitely intended.)

So if you are interested in protecting your investment as well as your skin by exploring window tint, stop by and talk it over with Amy and David Kurokawa at Rocky Mountain Auto Works. window film can provide sunblock for your car as well as the people inside it. Window film can:

- Protect against interior vehicle damage by blocking out up to 99.9% of the UV rays.
- 2. Block infrared heat up to 64% for a more comfortable interior temperature, which reduces A/C demands. The engine doesn't work as hard. That means better fuel economy and fewer carbon emissions.
- Protect against fading and cracking of auto interiors.
- Reduce glare and driver eye strain.
- Protect passengers skin by blocking UV exposure.

"UVA rays penetrate deep into the dermis, the skin's thickest layer. Unprotected exposure can lead to premature skin aging and wrinkling (photo aging), and suppression of the

Italian sausage, onions, mushrooms, fresh garlic and spices.


This year we will have a choice of Smoked Tri-Tip or Portabella Mushrooms for those who wish to have a different main course. The Tri-Tip

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

Joining the Club provided **Skip** and **Mardi Quain** with the opportunity to meet likeminded folks that love racing, the art of engineering and of course, Porsches. Thirty-three years of racing the 1962 Lotus 23 in

a local charity. It's probably still sitting behind a warehouse somewhere after they figured out what it was going to cost to repair" muses Skip.

A Lexus shares the garage with Skip and Mardi's 2002 C4S. The C4S fits the bill perfectly. A "wide body" 911. Skip specifically sought out a Tip-



historic races came to a close in August 2014 for Skip and Mardi. The Quains checked into a couple of car clubs to fill the social void that that racing had occupied. The Quains found PCA to be "just right".

Past Porsches

Like many of us, a number of Porsches have passed through our ownership over the years. Skip is no exception. "My first Porsche was a 1959 356 Conv "D". The Conv. "D" was the one that "got away". "I was single, working and it was my first Porsche. It was a happy time for me". Skip's response when pressed about getting another 356 was quick and unequivocal: "No way! I need a comfortable car now. That's what the C4S is for!".

Clearly an adroit businessman, Skip drove a 1969 911 T for a "company car". A noteworthy accomplishment and possibly the inspiration for a future "do it yourself" article Skip. A 1.8 liter 914 followed the 911. Skip's next Porsche was a 1978 911 Targa which he drove as a daily driver. Skip was involved in Tech start-up and also heavily with racing the Lotus 23, so the Targa wasn't maintained as it should have been and it suffered. "I ended up donating it to


AutoX series with both Skip & Mardi sharing the driving duties, and rallied. Skip candidly admits he and Mardi may be the worst rally team ever: "we ended up in a different time zone!". Dr. Quain's advice for couples planning to rally together: "Find out early who is good at doing what! Mardi is definitely the better rally driver.

Without hesitation, Skip says that there is no "next" Porsche they have designs on. The C4S runs and looks great and that "nothing on the horizon tickles our fancy".

Racing and Relationships

Skip described his love of historic racing with a great analogy. "If you were a golfer, it would be like getting to play golf with Ben Hogan's clubs in that era". Historic racing is about preserving the car and the racing history and the provenance of the car. After attending some historic races, Skip decided to acquire a 1962 Lotus 23. The Lotus was the 12th 23 model out of 141 built by Lotus. Designed by Colin Chapman as a small-displacement sports racing car, the 23 was purpose-built for FIA Group 4 racing in 1962-1963. The 23 had two seats, tube frame, horn, spare tire and a suitcase. Yes, of course a suitcase. At least a ride along mechanic wasn't required.

Skip relates his first event at Monterey, in 1981, sitting in the Lotus having had no prior racing experience.



On the track, in a car in front of Skip, Richie Ginther, ("Richie" Ginther was a driver from the United States; during a varied career, the 1965 Mexican Grand Prix saw Ginther take Honda's first Grand Prix victory) tells Skip not to worry, just "follow me; I'll show you the line through the corners". Of course, Ginther spins out on turn 11 in the first lap in front of the stands. So much for mentoring by the expert. Skip relates towing the car to Denver. Dallas and all over California with particular loathing for the trip from San Jose to Riverside Raceway in the middle of the night. When Skip started Vintage racing, he participated in nine or ten Vintage events a year but dialed back his racing in later years to 4 -5 events per year. Skip and Mardi were invited to numerous Concours events having won First and Second place in two Niello Concours at Serrano.

Restoring the Lotus took three years of hard work and "tears". An avid "Rockford Files" fan, Skip would roll out from under the Lotus to catch the action scenes on the TV in the garage. You have rightfully concluded by now that Skip was "single" at this point in his life; no one could compete with the Lotus. Even his buddies came in second: Skip turned in his *Raiders* football tickets in order to have more time for racing.

"I made a lot of friends at the track and various racing shops by just asking questions". Skip also discovered that some of these new-found friends believed that "the sooner you answer his questions (Skip's), the sooner he leaves".

Mardi became Skip's manager for the races. She made the hotel arrangements, carried the clip boards and the helmet down to the "Hot Pits" and even stood out in the heat with an umbrella over Skip's head while he was sitting in the Lotus on the Pre-Grid waiting for the race to start.

As part of documenting the car's racing provenance, Skip followed the car's past back to England noting that the Lotus had even raced at the Silverstone

Circuit.
While the Lotus and racing were fundamental elements of Skip's life, Skip and Mardi have no regrets about selling the car.

Closing

Mardi's love of fine art takes the Quain's on trips to Los Angeles where

they share the driving duties to visit art museums, walks along the harbors and trips to San Francisco. Skip relates that he shares her love of art just as she shared his passion for racing. Thank you **Skip and Mardi Quain** for sharing your passion and what's in your garage with *The Drifter*.





The True Origins of CRAB or The Legend of CRAB 0 How The Premier Porsche Weekender Got Its Name

Have you ever wondered how (or why) the Premier Porsche Weekender presented by SVR became known as CRAB? Well here boys and girls is the real story.

It all started in the late 1960's over a perceived grudge between Sacramento Valley Region (SVR) and Golden Gate Region (GGR). But we're getting ahead of ourselves.

Much has been written over the years about the history of CRAB, mostly by our good friend, the ageless Larry ("the older I get the faster I was") Wilson. But none of what has been written so far (at least that we recall) has talked about what really gave rise to this now world famous event.

Since much of what follows occurred almost fifty years ago, we hope the readers will permit some leeway with exact names and dates. And our apologies if we missed mentioning any key players in this little history lesson.

First, a little background. In the mid 1960's there were fewer PCA regions on the West Coast, but their members were every bit as enthusiastic as they are today. A few, like Pat and Larry Wilson, Ray and MaryJane Johansen, and Linda and I, are still around to recall those days. Regions in Northern California we all know today like Loma Prieta and Diablo did not exist, and Redwood Region had just secured its charter on July 25, 1969. Southern California PCA was much the same with far fewer regions than exist today.

In the 1960's the clothing styles were, needless to say, far different than today. In those days the normal attire for men at PCA dinner meetings and similar events were coats and ties. Regional "pride" was also the standard of the times. In 1965 the Porsche Parade was held in Santa Barbara and several west coast regions decided to "show their colors" by the men wearing "blazers" of a certain color that would identify them as being a member of a specific Region. GGR men wore gold blazers, and SVR men wore red blazers. I'm sure there were green, blue, and a myriad of other colors throughout the banquets at the Parade, but my memory isn't clear on that point. The colored-blazer tradition continued for a number of years and it was not uncommon to see those blazers at

regular dinner meetings into the early 1970's.

Before CRAB was conceived, various regions in Northern and Southern California would periodically schedule a once-a-year event known as the "West Coast Weekender". They typically had a format somewhat similar to our CRAB but much simplified. GGR was the "800-pound gorilla" in PCA then. At least half of the entrants at any multi-region event on the West Coast were expected to come from GGR. So SVR decided to host a West Coast Weekender in the spring of 1969. At that time we lived in what is now known as Silicone Valley and were members of GGR. Little did we know at the time that Sacramento and SVR would eventually become home in 1978.

As fate would have it, and for a variety of reasons that are not documented, only a few GGR members attended SVR's West Coast Weekender in 1969. As a result the event was considered unsuccessful and many in SVR felt that GGR had intentionally boycotted the event. As a result the relationship between SVR and GGR sunk to rock bottom. Personally this was very troubling because we had many good friends who were members of SVR. The GGR Board was also disturbed by this but didn't know what to do to correct the situation.

Now turn the clock ahead two years to 1971 and Linda was elected Vice-President of GGR. As such she was responsible for organizing the monthly dinner meetings. One of the first things Linda wanted to do was to find a way for SVR and GGR to "bury the hatchet". What she did turned out to be one of the key ingredients in what eventually became CRAB.

Linda contacted one of our friends in SVR and asked what they thought could be done to mend the fences between the regions. A joint dinner meeting was suggested. Linda then contacted Phillip Marks (aka "Goose"), who at the time had a management position at the El Macero Country Club. The two of them, along with several other members of SVR, jointly hatched a plan. Here is what they did.

Linda secured the enthusiastic approval from GGR to hold a joint dinner meeting with SVR at the El Macero Country Club in Davis. The

SVR Board was also excited about this idea and gave their approval as well. As we recall it was to be held in late April or early May. Phillip proposed a dinner featuring **Dungeness Crab.** He also arranged for GGR members to book rooms at El Macero at greatly discounted rates so they wouldn't worry about the drive back to the Bay Area after the dinner. Linda and Phillip decided on a seating plan where each SVR and GGR member would have to sit next to a member of the opposite region. This was accomplished by placing alternate gold and red linen napkins at each place setting. It worked perfectly. Phillip arranged for a small group to play dance music after dinner for those so inclined.

To say the event went well would be a major understatement. About 20-25 cars from GGR made the trip from the Bay Area and were joined by a similar number of SVR cars. Everyone got along famously and the hatchet was firmly buried in the ground then and there. In 1972, when the organizers for CRAB 1, Rich Farlinger, Jim Karver, and Ray Johansen went about planning that event they may have remembered how much everyone enjoyed the crab feed at El Macero and thought it would be a great idea to incorporate the concept into their event. And hey, maybe they could name the event "CRAB". So they contacted Phillip Marks once again and, as the old saying goes, the rest is history.

Epilogue...We can all be delighted that Phillip chose to feature crab at the joint dinner meeting. It just wouldn't have turned out the same if the meal had featured pork, beef, or fish.



Concours Series 2018 By John D'Angelo, Zone 7 Concours Chairperson

The 2018 Zone 7 Concours Series schedule is now set and registration is open for the 2018 Concours School, which kicks the season off on April 15th at Porsche of Livermore. The school starts a little earlier this year, at 9:00, and will be followed by a Car Care Clinic sponsored by Griot's Garage and the Diablo Region. There's a \$10 per person fee, lunch will be provided and the day is limited to 60 people. Please register at MotorsportReg by April 8th (search for "PCA Zone 7 Concours School" or there's a link to registration on the Zone 7 website).

If you've not participated in a PCA concours event but love a clean Porsche and friendly competition, the Zone 7 Concours Series might be for you. The emphasis of the Series is on maintenance and preparation of your Porsche. Competing gives a good reason to clean the things that you don't normally either look at or figure you'll get to...well...some other time. The school will run from 9am to 1pm, including a working lunch, and will cover rule changes (more about those below) for the 2018 Series. Also new this year will be a Griot's Car Care Clinic focused on paint correction and interior detailing. The clinic will immediately follow the judging school, from 1:00 to 3:00.

There are several rule changes coming this year, mostly to bring the Zone 7 Concours Series rules in line with PCA's National Parade Concours Rules and to create new categories so that cars with limited engine access (991s, Cayman, Boxsters) compete with like cars and won't have their engines judged. Wash and Shine will be renamed "Street" and storage compartments will no longer be judged as part of this Division; only interior and exterior will be judged. We hope this change lowers the bar for participation in Zone 7 Concours events and brings out some of those clean Porsches that are driven regularly.

The seven events that comprise the Zone 7 Concours Series are listed below. This year we lose the event that was hosted by the Yosemite Region, but Golden Gate's event at Carlsen Porsche in Redwood City returns to end the series in October. Five of the events return to familiar locations and the Sacramento Valley and Redwood Region's events will be held at new locations this year. If you're not interested in having your car judged, several events will have a display-only area.


